Resilience. After a year and a half of COVID closures and restrictions, our UCSB Education Abroad Program has come back as strong as ever. In 2021-22 we increased enrollments from zero to 345. Now, as EAP celebrates its 60th anniversary, we expect to send more than one thousand Gauchos to 35 countries in 2022-23. We are back to our pre-pandemic level of partici-



pation. Italy, Spain, the UK and France are the most popular destinations, but Germany and South Korea are also in the running. Programs in Australia, New Zealand and Japan, which were completely closed to our students, are reopening for 2022-23. China is one of the few countries in the world that remains closed to study abroad students, unless they have Chinese citizenship. Several new program options have been recently or will be launched, including the University of Iceland, the London School of Economics, and business-related courses in Copenhagen and London.

We continue to pivot to keep the EAP dream alive—meeting with prospective students in person and via Zoom and conducting information sessions about academics, financial aid, housing, health and safety, and international travel. Climate change, which had serious impacts on countries in western Europe this summer, will also be addressed. Our goal is to be able to continue sending more than one thousand students abroad by 2023-24. Our gateway to the world will also allow us to receive several hundred EAP exchange students from our partner universities abroad.

I want to personally thank all of you who contributed to our Scholarship Fund and the Director's Fund for Excellence last year, and invite all of our alumni readers to consider giving. The economic impacts of the inflation and housing shortages, combined with the ongoing effects of COVID have affected the finances of many of our students. They will

Studying abroad in Spain showed me not only a new culture but also a new outlook on life that I would not have attained had I stayed in Santa Barbara. This was a once in a lifetime opportunity only brought to me by the generosity of the scholarship that I received.

While I had taken language courses taught in Spanish, this was the first time that I had taken a subject course (Psychology) taught in a foreign language. Although challenging, I believe this truly made my Spanish comprehension skills stronger. It also forced me to get out of my comfort zone and speak to other students in Spanish.

The Elliott Family EAP Scholarship By Nicholas Elliott '11

The pleasant murmur of voices on the street below, children chasing each other and laughing in a foreign language. Church bells chime in the morning, bright Tuscan sun filters through dark green shutters. Footsteps on the cobblestones, reverberating against medieval stone walls, well worn before Christopher Columbus.

I vividly recall the feeling that first morning in Italy, discombobulated from jet-lag but passionately excited for life. I didn't know it just then, but the next 12 months would be some of the most challenging, exhilarating and rewarding months of my life.



Born and raised in California, I had the great fortune to embark on a few international excursions with family during my formative years. These trips gave me a glimpse into other cultures, languages, and customs. Not everyone drives on the right side of the road. Not everyone speaks the same language or eats the same food as we do in America.

During my college application process, I took special notice of the University of California's robust Education Abroad Program, noticing the multitude of study options and extensive supporting resources. Freshman year, almost before looking at my class schedule, I was already researching options for an international exchange opportunity.

Junior year finally arrived, and Italy became a reality. I spent two months in Siena on an intensive language program, and another 10 months in Padova, a city in Northern Italy outside of Venice. I lived with Italian roommates and took all of my courses in Italian at a 900 year old, 100,000 student University. I gained lifelong friends in my roommates and their family, I learned a new language and culture, and I saw a dozen European countries.

I returned to my senior year at UCSB with a sense of appreciation and awe. I had lived most of my life in one reality, and in returning to that reality I saw how many other realities, cultures, cities, customs, and friends existed.







In a present moment, one cannot know the impact a decision might make in the future. Some decisions may make little difference; they drop like stones upon the floor, momentum arrested. Others may continue to roll, gain speed, and turn into avalanches of future moments and experiences and connections. My decision to study abroad changed my life for the better; it opened my eyes to a broader world, it gave me the confidence to figure it out (whatever the scenario), and it brought friends and family into my life that I cherish to this day.



Studying abroad comes with many costs, and I count myself forever grateful for the opportunity I was privileged enough to experience. The Elliott Family Scholarship is our way of giving back, of opening an opportunity for someone that might otherwise prove impossible. If you are considering an abroad experience, please, give it some extra thought. There are resources available that can help transform the idea into reality. One can never fully foresee the avalanche of future ripples a single decision can make!

It was here that I finally felt free and embrace the possibilities of meeting new people.
